## NEWS AND ACTIVITIES OF THE KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS ST. LOUIS COUNCIL 3335





Brother knight Irvin Voltin, an active member of Sacred Heart Church in Pomeroy and their Knights of Columbus council, died two weeks after reaching his 95th birthday. Having been placed in Abbyshire Nursing Home in Gallia County, his spiritual care became the responsibility of St. Louis Church. We visited him once or twice a week and brought him Holy Communion. It was a privilege to get to know him better. Even though under morphine, we were able to have some great conversation. We quickly learned that Irvin Voltin was a member of the "Great Generation" that won World War II. As a U.S. Navy Electronic Technician's Mate Second Class from 1943-46, he was attached to the 7th Australian Infantry Division for the final amphibious assault in the Pacific Theater, seizing the city of Balikpapan, Borneo in July 1945. In August the war was over. We only read about history; Irvin Voltin lived it.

After being discharged he became a computer designer, on the ground floor as a true pioneer in the development of computers. At the time it was difficult to even dream of the laptops and pocket computers that we can even use to make phone calls anywhere near a tower. Even in the 1970s a room full of computer equipment would be needed to have the storage and memory to do what a smart little pocket cell phone can do today, not to mention all of the apps. In the photo on the left, Voltin is at his large desktop computer in the 1970s, working for NASA in Huntsville, Alabama. With the IBN 360 main frame computer in the 1960s, each line of a program and each piece of data had to be typed and punched on a separate IBM card.

Irvin introduced us to his wife Beulah via their wedding picture. She was three years older. They were married for 68 years until her death in 2018. Irvin missed Beulah very much and I consoled him saying, "Someday we'll be all together again for that big party in Heaven." Make sure that we get there, dear reader. Both born in Minnesota, they somehow found their way to a small Meigs County farm in their retirement. They had 10 children, evenly divided among the sexes. Their photo is on the right. He was proud of his grandson, Sfc Sam Voltin, trained for airborne and special forces; he came for the funeral in full uniform. An expert bugler and a petty officer from the Naval base in Virginia did a great job with taps.

The most impressive of all was Irvin's solid faith as his pastor, Fr. Mark Moore observed. He would often attend daily Mass and had a very good prayer life. His Bible and prayer book were at his bedside. Jaga's prayer that Irvin would die at home was answered. Irving took his last breath at home the day after leaving Abbyshire. To our surprise, Irvin planned his funeral in detail beforehand. Since he enjoyed socializing with friends, Irvin hosted a unique funeral reception with a selection of fine wines for his guests....ever see that before? May he rest in peace. Rest assured; Irvin is praying for all of us.
